

2025: trials, triumphs and togetherness

If 2025 taught us anything, it is that life can deliver heartbreak and hope in the very same breath.

Early June brought devasting news: **Ben's** youngest sister, **Vina Pereira** – undisputed healthiest of his four sisters – received the shocking diagnosis of ovarian cancer.

Vina is the mother of four and grandmother of 12.

Within days, family members began landing in **Victoria** like a relay team. **Sister Lisa** flew in from our ancestral village in **Nagoa**, **Goa**, **India**, and **Sister Gemma**, already on her regular visit from **San Antonio**, **Texas**, joined the mission of support, prayer, and home-cooked comfort.

As if 2025 wanted to test our emotional endurance while we were absorbing the news about **Vina**, September brought another piece of heartbreaking news: **Nerine Sequeira**, daughter of **Ben's** younger sister, **Selma Sequeira**, his goddaughter, and the mother of two athletic boys – and already a veteran of beating breast cancer during Covid – learned she now faced cancer in the mediastinum near her lungs. Her grit and humor [still intact] reminded us daily of what courage looks like.

Both are responding to treatments. Please pray for total healing. But the year was not done with surprises.

In March, **Ben** and **Karl** executed a top-secret, three-day stealth mission to **Goa** to attend the blessing of *Premanjali*, once the **Pires** ancestral home and lovingly gifted by **Ben's** father to the **Presentation Sisters**. The dramatic surprise was for **Sister Gemma** and **Sister Lisa**, who were so stunned they forgot to scold them for not warning them. [See page 3]



In May, **Karl** – visiting from **Japan** – and **Jason** tackled the **BMO Half Marathon** in **Vancouver**. They finished triumphantly, cheered by family, who proudly celebrated with the athletes despite contributing

zero kilometres themselves.

This was all a warmup for the **BMW Berlin Marathon** in September where spouses **Saho** and **Anita** joined **Ben** and **Laila** in forming the cheering squad this side of **Brandenburg Gate**.

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August brought a delightful first: with **Sister Gemma** and **Sister Lisa** visiting **Victoria**, **Ben** and **Laila** and designated driver **Jason** took a memorable trip to the **Sunshine Coast** – ferry, coastal skies and all.



And the Berlin Marathon launched Ben and Laila on a 57-day odyssey. They did Belgium and Luxembourg by themselves. Karl snd Saho joined them in France and four Balkan countries – Albania, North Macedonia, Bulgaria and Romania --before Ben and Laila's rendezvous in Japan with Laila's siblings, spouses, a cousin and friend. At every opportunity during their travels, they lit candles and paused to petition for complete healing of **Vina** and **Nerine** in various denominational churches, mosques, temples and shrines.

In **Japan**, **Ben** and **Laila's Japanese** family – the **Izawas** – hosted an unbelievable three-day bus trip [hotel and dinners included] to **Takayama** and other surrounding must-visit areas.

Karl and **Saho** hosted **Ben**, **Laila** and available family members at their home in **Yokohama**, where, as usual, **Saho** prepared delicious meals.

The grandchildren continued their own adventures.

Misha, now 21, and a senior at **Western University**, spent a couple of weeks aboard a research vessel off **Taiwan** studying marine life, proving that some students do read their textbooks — on the deck of a boat. She squeezed in trips to **Europe** and to **Vancouver** for her birthday.

Kaiya, 16, is acing Grade 11 at Little Flower Academy, earned her "L" [BC drivers, you have been warned], dazzled in Arts Umbrella's dance recital "Kinder Tales," and toured Montreal and Toronto with her parents and brother before making her decision on where she will study after high school.

Reyan, 14, is in Grade 9 at **Vancouver College** and, as no surprise, excels as goalie in soccer [football], baseball, and is increasingly impressive in golf – likely preparing for a future in whatever sport offers the freest travel.

Through every joy, challenge, marathon, ferry ride and family reunion, 2025 reminded us that the greatest adventure we share is simply being a family – rooted in love, strengthened by faith, and powered by humor.























A homecoming of love and surprises

On March 18, the quiet **Dias Vaddo** [neighborhood] of **Nagoa** village in north **Goa**, **India**, was abuzz with joy and prayer at the blessing of **Premanjali** -- a sanctuary whose name blends with **Sanskrit** words for "**Love**" [**Prema**] and "**Offering**" [**Anjali**] to beautifully capture its spirit.

Karl, who practices law in **Tokyo's** fast lanes, and **Ben** decided to pull of a covert operation: a surprise visit to **Goa** for the ceremony. Their targets were **Ben's** elder sisters -- **Sister Gemma**, visiting from **San Antonio**, **Texas**, and **Sister Lisa**, who is involved in **Premanjali** programs supporting vulnerable women, raising awareness about abuse, and working with the migrant community.

Their mission succeeded magnificently. Their astonishment was worth every air mile.

Premanjali stands on sacred family ground -- our ancestral property once belonged to **Ben's** great-grandparents in the 1800s. They had a small house on the property. Their only child married **Ben's** grandfather, **John Felix Pires**. Thus it became the "**Pires ancestral home**."

Ben's dad, Edward Pires, was born in the small house in 1910. Six years later, John Pires tore down the small house and built a larger one on the site that stood that way for 107 years.

In 2000, **Edward Pires** gifted the house to the **Presentation Sisters**, a **Catholic** religious order, founded in 1775 in **Ireland**, that **Sister Gemma** and **Sister Lisa** joined in 1957 and 1958 respectively. In 2002, it opened as **Premanjali** -- and soon became the beating heart of the **Nagoa** community.

Ben went to Goa in 2012 to sign documents to make the property transfer legal and in 2019 Sister Lisa was transferred to *Premanjali*.

By 2023, the programs in the house had outgrown the space, requiring the building of a second floor that was completed [nearly] in time for the blessing.

After three days in Goa, Karl and Ben capped their trip -- due to a long flight layover [Karl heading back to Japan, Ben to Canada] -- in New Delhi allowing nostalgic visits to: Ben's old school, St. Columba's; the Central Institute of Education, where Edward Pires served as principal; the family home on the institute's premises; St. Mary's Church, the family's parish; and they had tea with the Presentation Sisters at the convent school -- next to the church -- where Ben's sisters once studied.

A homecoming of love and precious memories -- proof that some surprises are truly heaven sent.


