UPBSFAAI turn-over ceremonies 2009: THE YEAR OF THE UP BETA SIGMA

Such is the expected declaration of newlyelected President of the UP Beta Sigma Fraternity Alumni Association Brod Ruben Pascual, Batch 76-C Mabuhay, as he takes his oath as the leader of the fraternity in 2009 and 2010 today, January 30, 2009 at Club Filipino, San Juan City.

He succeeds Brod Dario Sabularse, Batch '65 of UP Los Banos, who just completed an impressive stint as UPBSAAI President in 2007-2008. Brod Dario steered the alumni association in a term of "internal house clean-

ing", spirited travels to different parts of the country to support foreign-alumni projects and various meetings of the national assembly of fraternity chapters from all schools, and capped his term

with the successful staging of the UP Grand Centennial Ball at the Philippine International Convention Center last December 16. (See full story at p.6).

The auspicious turnover ceremonies today at Club Filipino signal high hopes for all alumni and resident brothers as Brod Dario passes the baton of leadership to Brod Ruben, who

is perhaps the best prepared President of UPBSFAAI. Brod Ruben was the Executive Vice-President in 2007-2008 and has been a long-time member of the board of directors of the organization, serving past Presidents Matias Defensor, Vic Tupaz, Romy Lumauig, Ramon Paje, Vic Ramos and Dario.

"The advantage of Brod Ruben as our new President is his familiarity with alumni affairs, the past projects of the fraternity, and the aspirations of most," past President Vic Ramos said. "He has been a President-in-waiting for

sometime now," added Ramon "This year, 2009, Paje, another past president.

> The line-up of the new board stretches from 50's all the way up to the 21st century. Directors from

the 60's, 70's and 80's represent the majority of the board members, ushering the transition of alumni management to new generations.

There are a number of novelties in this new set of directors and officers. UP Baguio and UP Mindanao were given slots in the board for the first time, represented by Brod Ying Palafox ('87) and Brod Enrimand Dejeto (2000),

respectively. For the first time also, there is a Vice-President for International Affairs, in the person of Sonny Pagador ('76Dil) who is President of the Federation of Beta Sigma Alumni Associations in North America. Exofficio members of the board are the current resident Grand Princeps in campuses, officers who are not elected directors, and heads of the different UP Beta Sigma alumni chapters.

Brod Ruben is committing to continue past projects of his predecessors while intending to pursue new directions. "It is my intention to complete and consolidate the past programs and achievements of previous alumni organizations, while introducing new programs and projects that many brothers have clamored for," Brod Ruben told The Betan. He submits today to his board and the assembly a comprehensive program dubbed "UP BETA SIGMA" with each letter representing a program theme (See full story at p. 5). "This may be an ambitious program, but with massive participation and support of the brods, all these may be achieved," the new president declared.

Brod Ruben leads an impressive roster of board of directors led by Brod Victor Valdepenas '63 as the Executive Vice-president, who is President of Unionbank. Like Vic, he also invited back to the board Brods Rene Derueda, former DENR undersecretary and Pert Somera, former regional director of the Bureau of Internal Revenue, Butch Madarang and Jet Arriola. Five members of the past board were retained as required by our By-laws, including Ruben, Butch, Joe Cabanayan, Jojo Criador and Ron Justo. First time board members include Rolly Reyes, Press Undersecretary and Chairman of National Boradcasting Network, Rudy Oviedo, Lloyd Dizon, Andre Umali, Ying Palafox and Enrimand Dejeto.

The age factor was also a consideration in the selection of the board members, which spans 6 decades. Brod Pert is Batch '57, Brods Vic, Rolly, Rene and Jet from the '60s, Brods Ruben, Rudy, Butch and Joe from the '70's, Brods Jojo, Ron, Ying, and Lloyd from the '80's, Brod Andre from the '90s and Brod Enrimand is Batch 2000. The age distribution of the board members would effectively integrate old-school thought with modern ideas, resulting in to a more balanced and dynamic policy-making body.

Named executive officers were Ruben J. Pascual, **President**, Victor B. Valdepenas, **Executive Vice-president**, Floro T. Tadena, **Vice-president for Luzon**, Jess Latoja, **Vicepresident for Visayas**, Benjamin Albarece, **Vice-president for Mindanao**, Ruben Abon, **Vice-president for NCR**, Ronan H. Justo, **Treasurer** and Federick Angeles, **Secretary** with **Legal advisers** Leo Delano C. Pascua and Augusto Y. Arreza. Founder Melecio A. Arranz Jr. as the **Adviser**.

Given the wide array of talents and experiences each board member is endowed with; expect the incoming Board of Directors to ably assist the UPBSFAAI president in the fruition of programs and projects, reaching the ambitions of the current crop of officers for the benefit of the fraternity and all its chapters, local and international.



EDITORIAL

FEATURES ONE BRIEF SHINING MOMENT

It was December 1978, the 2nd year the UP Lantern Parade was restored in the campus but martial law still reigned over the country. I was appointed as a member of the panel of judges that would hand out the awards to the winning entries in this event. Thrilled, since the brods now had a ringer within the committee, I urged them to enter the contest.

Several brods that year were actors in the Behn Cervantes directed play, "Sigaw ng Bayan." GP Sonny Pagador ('76) was preparing to launch the fraternity's production play, "Dahil Sa Kapirasong Lupa" the following year. Sonny became excited about the fraternity's participation in the Lantern Parade. It would perform as an advanced advertisement for the coming play. The brods were all for it, given their penchant for wanting to put up a show.

Remembering the 60's brods who paraded in hoods during the bygone Hay Ride, I advised the residents to wear hoods as added costumes. They were roused at the idea and chose to wear black ones which was an odd choice given the festive occasion. On that fateful day, I was with the rest of the judges at the back of the UP administration building, excitedly awaiting the brods.

The Malmon "lantern" came in a cart pulled by a carabao. Curse that Danny Paz !('78). He said he was going to make a beautiful work of art of Malmon, bragging that he was from the College of Fine Arts. It looked like an ugly effigy, the ones that they burned in front of the US Embassy. The brods, large in number, followed, doing the snake dance as planned. Suddenly the carabao, still pulling the cart, sped out of the amphitheatre with the brods madly chasing after the berserk animal. Frightened bystanders scampered for cover.

I found out later that idiot Nonoy Tagaro('77) who was leading the snake dance put his flaming torch near the eye of the carabao and spooked it. The brods then hurriedly exited and must have just finished the procession. They proceeded to the Christmas party slated at Eric Ines' ('69) place.

During the deliberations for the winning entries, I was silent all throughout the conference. Bahala na nga kayo diyan. No way was that atrocious piece of mangled work going to win. It was only the next day that I found out what else transpired with the brods during the parade.

The brods had initially assembled at the tambayan, the PHAN steps. When the parade was ongoing, they just inserted, no, bulldozed themselves into the procession, to the consternation of the other organizations. Those clowns didn't even bother to assemble behind the Vinzon's Hall with the rest of the entries as per instructions.

Wearing brightly colored Malmon shirts with the theme "Paskohan sa UP," black hoods and carrying blazing torches, the brods joined the parade. Yay Topacio('77) said that the adrenalin was flowing as they punched their fists into the night, yelling "Beta Sigma! Beta Sigma!" Brods of the 60's led by Mel de Santos ('68) were at the flower boxes raising their plastic cups filled with the Betan Screwdriver. They cheered the residents on shouting "Hurrah! Hurrah!" Sweet and painful memories of another time must have crossed their minds.

Somebody shouted "Para kay Butch Landrito!" (Para kila Bogan, Bange at Yongyong Afable na rin.) The residents knew the story as told to them by the elders but most of the university didn't know because they were not there. The onlookers were astonished that the brods chose to present themselves in a bizarre fashion during a supposed season of merriment. The brods wanted to make a statement. "We're back!" The return of the Jedi Knights after an absence of 9 years.

Whispers were circulating among the crowd at the old AS building steps. "Parang Ku Klux Klan! which would have been enough to scare the daylights out of any Negro watching. Howdee de la Cruz ('74) and Ruben Pascual ('76) marched too by the way but they had no need for the hoods. When this intriguing assemblage of hoods approached the AS Basement, it stopped. "Tigil! Tigil!"

As if on cue, the brods started singing "A rapid trip to Salem..." It reached a crescendo when they reached the line, "...WHILE THE UPSILON SITS ALL DAY!" that reverberated all over the ancient columns and floors of the old AS building. Siyempre walang nakapalag. Take that Pepsi. Up your nose with the rubber hose. Some wounds will never really heal.

Nugget Aquino('79) who was still in high school at the time, was gleefully watching the parade with his dad along with a packed crowd at the Engineering building. They cheered and clapped as the lantern participants filed before them. Stoned silence descended upon the spectators when these dark knights, already tired, passed before the crowd. The brods started singing "Glory, Glory" again just to reenergize themselves when a small group of engineering students began mimicking them. They were quickly and viciously shouted down by the brods. "Putang ina ninyo, tumahimik kayo diyan. Kumakanta kami. Upakan naming kayo! Oh boy.

Lito Barreto ('75) or Pek as he is affectionately called by the brods after the actor, Gregory Peck, narrated to me a conversation among a group of students he overheard at the College of Business Administration. A student speaking with a colegiala accent, "Did you see those Beta Sigmans last night and they were singing this song about the Upsilon?" One of the discussants, replied, "Yeah, that was the time my brod died." "Oops!" as Pek covered his mouth in between giggles,"Pinaguusapan na naman tayo!" Palagi naman tayo pinaguusapan.

Well, after that I can only surmise that the people have reached a mixed conclusion about us. They are either in awe of us, hate us or just plainly curious as to what makes us tick. It's as if the outsiders want to reach out and touch us to find out if we're real.

Ted Borrero ('75) simply said that it's the mystique we've created fueled by those endless storytelling about ourselves during gatherings. We are not perfect and there can't even be one consistent description to portray ourselves. The brods love the group but hate each other's guts. We have the zeal to attain laudable goals and fail each other when most needed. The fraternity takes pride in the brods' individual accomplishments but are quick to criticize one's motives. We work for the common good of society and yet are mercenary by nature. The brods strive to imbibe the noblest traditions in the credo but at times blunder down to the level of Huns. A potful of contradictions to say the least.

I remember some of Shakespeare's lines back in college which some brods have used a phrase to describe themselves but never bother to reprint that whole passage:

"This story shall the good man teach his son; And Crispin Crispian shall ne'er go by, From this day to the ending of the world, But we in it shall be remembered ------WE FEW, WE HAPPY FEW, WE BAND OF BROTHERS; For he to-day that sheds his blood with me Shall be my brother. The 2008–2009 UP Beta Sigma Fraternity Alumni Association, Inc. (UPBSFAAI) Board of Directors and Officers focused on its immediate goal to keep the Fraternity very visible and active throughout the country, even in foreign lands.

We were able to maintain close coordination and immediate contact with the Beta Sigma National Assembly and with the Federation of the Beta Sigma Fraternity Alumni Association in North America. The UPBSFAAI has been actively involved in the National Assembly quarterly meetings and joined in its activities. To enumerate a few examples, the association participated in the National Convention for 2007–2008 and the medical missions held in Ilocos Sur, Sultan Kudarat, Calamba, Laguna, and in Bicol.

The UPBSFAAI under my term played a major role in the setting-up of a Beta Sigma Village in Gihing, Hagonoy, Davao Del Sur as its contribution to the Gawad Kalinga Program. It also sent delegates/representatives to anniversary celebrations of various Beta Sigma Chapters such as that of the Siliman University Chapter in Dumaguete City, the San Carlos University Chapter in Cebu, the Manila East Assembly and that of the GAUF-La Salle Chapter. The same has been undertaken in Toronto, Canada as a side trip after attending the International Convention in Montreal.

As an effort to maintain and even enhance closer coordination among the three sectors of the Beta Sigma Fraternity Coordinating Council, a meeting was held in the country by the respective heads: Brods Sam Strong, Sonny Pagador, and yours truly as President of the UPBSFAAI. In our discussions, it was pointed out that the National Assembly will initiate efforts to come up with certain livelihood projects. Amongst the projects agreed upon are to continuously support the Medical and Dental Missions in the country and the establishment a Beta Sigma Clinic. The UPBSFAAI was also tasked to come up with a Unified Directory for all Beta Sigma Fraternity

Chapters, which consists of more or less 100 chapters and approximately 15,000 members. We intend to gather at least 75% of all the members and their contact details in a unified directory to be published within the year.

The UPBSFAAI has also provided assistance to its residents belonging to different U.P. Chapters. The association supported the residents in their activities and other projects and officials functions by providing financial aid, in addition to the active participation of alumni brods. It has realized several fund raising campaigns to help support the anniversary celebration of the U.P. Diliman brods held every July and during August for the Los Baños brods.

We also kept our presence felt in U.P. Los Baños-U.P. Diliman chapters dual meet. The UPBSFAAI had participated in various activities of the U.P. Sigma Beta Sorority for the benefit of the alumnae and its resident members.

We also participated regularly in the Tetada Kalimasada, a unique form of meditation that originated in Indonesia, which also is another form of martial arts.

The Board of Directors sponsored golf tournaments in 2007 and 2008 under the UP Barkada, a group consisting of several other fraternities. The said activities showed not only the athletic capabilities of the Beta Sigma brotherhood, it also generated the funds to support the Beta Sigma Secretariat Office currently manned by two (2) persons and provided provisions for office equipment.

The UPBSFAAI appreciates the sponsorship of Brod JJ Jayme of the rental for the Secretariat Office for the year 2007 and most of 2008. We also participated in the U.P. Grand Centennial Launching on January 8, 2008 having sponsored three trees in the Light-A-Tree Project, with each corresponding to P 5,000.00. Our alumni association then joined in the U.P. Centennial Foundation Day Celebration through a whole page advertisement in the souvenir program, congratulating the University of the Philippines for this occasion.

The association actively participated in the celebration of our Fraternity's 62nd Anniversary celebration. On July 18 we had the Golf Tournament at the Valley Golf Club which became known as the UP Centennial Golf Classics dedicated to Barkada ng UP Fratmen and the holding of the Presidents Cup: UPBSFAAI Dario C. Sabularse. On July 19-20, 2008 we joined the Beta Sigma Fraternity National Assembly in the National Convention held in Zamboanga City.

On August 9, 2008, we held the inauguration of the UP Manila College of Arts and Sciences Gateway. This was coordinated by Brod Butch Madarang who is the incumbent President of the UPMBSF Jesus Jayme Development Foundation Inc. The week of August 11–15, 2008 was the U.P. Los Baños Chapter Founding Anniversary Celebration. On the 16th of August, we held our Testimonial Lunch in honor of Brod Lucenito N. Tagle, Batch 1955 as Comelec Commissioner at Splash Mountain Resort, Los Baños, Laguna. On October 24, 2008, we celebrated the birthday of our founder, Melecio "Rico" A. The UP Beta Sigma Fraternity and UP Sigma Beta Sorority organized the successful UP Grand Centennial Ball and Raffle last December 16, 2008 held at the Reception Hall of the Philippine International Convention Center.

The event was officially hosted by the UP Alumni Association (UPAA) but was conceptualized and executed by the brothers and sisters. Close to 2,000 UP alumni abroad, officials, staff and students attended and generating about P1 million for various UP projects. This is the first time in UP history that such a huge number from the UP community gathered to party, a well-deserved celebration after a hectic yet fulfilling celebration of UP's one hundred years.

Leading the major sponsors are the Department of Tourism and San Miguel Corporation. Other major sponsors include PAGCOR, Smart Communications, GMA-7, PCSO, Unionbank, AMA, Sen. Juan Ponce Enrile, and Ilocos Sur Governor DV Savellano.

Brod Willy Nepomoceno superbly emceed the grand affair and carried the program flawlessly.

"Grace Under Pressure" By Ronan H. Justo '88

I believe this was supposed to be our maxim in those very trying days when I took part in the preparations for UP's Grand Centennial Ball.

It started well, in fact.

Brod Ruben Pascual, UPD77 asked me sometime in September last year to attend a meeting with Sigma Beta Alumnae Foundation at the Bahay ng Alumni. Tagging along, brods Rommel Ladip '87and Alvin Aguinaldo '88, we were welcomed by Brod Franky Cornejo, Executive Director of the UP Alumni Association and several other bros which include Rene"Butch" Madarang, Eugenio "Gene" Puente and Alberto "Poti" Aparato. Already seated in the conference room were a number of sorority sisters that included Josie Saddul and Fe Tantiansu among others.

It was no ordinary meeting.

I learned that the UPAA has designated the Beta Sigma and the Sigma Beta to be the lead organizers of the Grand Centennial Ball, the culminating activity of UP's centennial celebrations and I am to help. I had initial reservations that the activity would be adding to my already over-loaded extra-curricular activities but at the same time I felt very excited. It was a very rare opportunity to contribute to the centennial and to the university with a long and distinguished history of service to the nation.

After the meeting, Ruben immediately formed his Beta Sigma Secretariat Committee with Gene Puente and Poti Aparato as frontliners for coordination and ticket sales. Ruben tasked me to draft Sponsorship Packages for the event, write various sectors of the university and invite affiliate organizations of the Fraternity to support the event.

Through it all, I had only praises and admiration for our founder, Brod Melecio "Rico" Arranz, Jr.. He was very active in those sessions including selling tickets and using his network to enlist support for the centennial activity. To this day, I vividly recall as he was about to leave, he even asked Ruben: "Brod, may ipapagawa pa ba kayo sa akin?" which was met by a moment of

silence, kasi nahihiya na kami.

But with Brod Rico's unwavering commitment, the team has always been inspired to do more in the service of the university, the Fraternity included.

As we were nearing the set deadline, fiery squabbles among the brods ensued because there were very few of us in the team faced with gargantuan tasks. We started performing multi-functions. While selling tickets to the members of Congress and soliciting for sponsors, I was also conducting research and collecting centennial photos for inclusion in the souvenir program. I also started not reporting for work in congress to cover for the lack of manpower in our Secretariat.

But with Ruben's dedicated leadership and firm resolve to put the potentials of his team to the max, we prevailed over such very trying times. We pooled our resources together to achieve one common goal - the success of the Grand Centennial Ball.

At the end of every chaotic and tiring day, Ruben would also sit with all of us over bottles of beer and continually goad us to perform better. However, we never failed to amuse Ruben, what with Poti's Chicharon and my "Commercial Papaitan" as Cris Michelena would put it.

At the end of each day, we always find time to laugh at each other's jokes and reinforce the blood of brotherhood flowing in our veins.

On December 16, 2008, dressed in our best "barong tagalog" we all met at the Philippine International Convention to enjoy three months of hell preparing for the cen-

I first knew Butch when I was at the UP Elementary School some 46 years ago. But I only got to be close to him when we were at our third year at the UP High School. We both were in the same A section and were COCC cadets in the PMT training. That was also a time when things were quite rough for me at home. My mom was diagnosed with terminal cancer that year and I deliberately avoided going home to watch her dying and my family situation unravel. So I hung around a lot with Butch and his child-

hood friends that included Willie Lazaro at Area 2 at the UP campus. I was considered a nerd then and previously hang out only with my kind that included our class valedic-

torian, Rey Casambre and my buddy Rolly Aguino, who also lived on campus staff housing. Hanging out with Butch exposed me to more of the real life out there as his friends came from a broader swath of our society. In high school, Rolly Aquino and I initiated the formation of the first KM high school chapter, influenced no doubt by Rollie's housemates - Nilo Tayag and Ernie Machaiya, who were already known nationalist college students at that time. Butch was just amused by that activity of mine, though we talked a lot about the social injustices of the country and the imperialist domination of its governance policies. He was more comfortable with the dialectics of the street – the privileges of the have-not children of the low-ranking staff and the sort of haves of the faculty children and other richer kids at school. I found comfort associating with his street-wise friends; he organized into a Black Cats gang, as they gave me another view of the world.

In college, we found ourselves both pursuing

"At sa pagkakataong ang katawan kong lupa'y babagsak, ito'y matamis kong alay sa bayan kong hinamak." e n g i n e e r i n g degrees and Butch right away joined the Beta Sigma fraternity. In my second year, I too was initiated into the same fraternity,

though Butch had misgivings about me joining a fraternity. He was concerned not only about my physical conditioning to withstand the usual punishment inflicted upon initiates, but also about the impact it would have on my scholarship. He knew that I needed to stay in good academic status to be able to continue going to school. I actually was recruited not by Butch but by UP Prepian friends who hang out at the billiard tables and joined Butch in becoming Beta Sigmans in their first year. But at that time, I needed another home, a group I could belong to with some purpose but also with kindred spirits and fraternal support. So, I became even closer to Butch as we became fraternity brothers.

As fratmen, we had our dose of drinking excesses and testy encounters with rival fratmen. Butch, because of his solidly built physique and composure in confrontations was a natural frontliner in these confrontations, though I never can recall him ever initiating any of these game-of-chicken confrontations. Because his home was on campus, he also was dragged into each conflict that developed and his home also became a natural hangout for our brods. When we would play hooky, we would buy some booze and hangout at their backyard. Even if Butch was not there, we could always find his older brothers Ading and Zoilo to shoot the breeze, so to speak.

We though our lives would just pass through this usual phase of reckless youthful living, and we ould eventually earn our degrees, get jobs and raise families. Until that fateful evening, when Ed Abon and I, after our math class, found ourselves heading to Butch place to pick him up and park Ed's car while we walked to the Betan hangout at the AS building where our Hay Ride point of participation would start. We were able

tennial celebration.

As I entered the main lobby of PICC, I immediately got a glimpse of the UP Oblation and told myself "This is it! Tonight, the entire U.P. Community will judge the performance of the U.P. Beta Sigma Fraternity and Sigma Beta Sorority." I convened a short meeting of all my teammates to give final instructions and ordered them to man their posts. I stood by the Registration Area to oversee the readiness of our preparations and to provide assistance to brods Poti Aparato and Gene Puente.

At around 5:00 P.M., guests started coming in. At first, I had qualms that we would not be able to fill the Reception of PICC. But in no time, the hall was already overflowing with UP alumni, both young and old.

The event started with the recognition of UP's three generations of graduates. I wanted to stay at the Reception Hall because my family was included amongst the awardees. I wanted to honor my late Grand Father, Prof. Severino R. Hermosura of the College of Veterinary Medicine and give the Certificate of Recognition to my grandmother.

As the saying goes, duty above all. After briefly seeing the photographs of my grandfather being flashed on the wide screen, I quickly went back to my post and continued monitoring my teammates.

UP President Emerlinda Roman, wife of Brod Pat Roman, addressed the huge crowd and inspired the UP alumni to remain confident of the university's relentless pursuit for academic excellence. The evening was also made more meaningful by the performances of the UP Jubilarians, the Brothers Band, Ding Malazo and Orchestra, and a surprise number by the Electromaniacs led by UP Alumni Lenny De Jesus.

But the best performance of the evening was still by Brod Willie Nepomuceno. The crowd was constantly at its feet, delighted by Brod Willie Neps' hilarious antics as the Centennial Ball emcee.

Brod Butch Madarang and 2008 - 2009 UPBSFAAI President Dario Sabularse successfully launched a nude painting session with many contemporary artists participating, including Brod Paking Verano. Until

past midnight, the guests were treated with live dance music. I was very happy to see the UP alumni enjoying the night, singing with the live band, dancing with friends, posing for caricature sketches and having a drink with long absent classmates and friends.

After all the guests left, we started packing-up and proceeded to the Secretariat Office to have a drink until around 4:00 in the morning. It took me three days to rest for such a tiring event.

I arranged a party at my house a few days after the event to thank all my brods and friends who have extended assistance to the Secretariat. When Ruben came over to celebrate with us, I said to him in jest: "O brod nakapahinga na. Trabaho na uli, game na ako".

to catch up with our brods who already started the motorcade ride earlier, though we were in the rear group. After an incident where one of our brods had some words with some Upsilonians on the side of the road where our truck passed, we were advised by our GP, Jopet Laraya, to disassemble at the AS lobby, while he and some officers attempted to deescalate the situation by talking to the Upsilonian officers headed by Nonong Trevino. After a few minutes, the Upsilonians attempted to storm us in two surges. Individual scuffles broke out in the dim of the night

as several of us met them down the side of the lobby, along the walk and pathways between the AS and the BA buildings. I was with Butch as we chased a group of Upsilonians who were holding sticks. Butch and I had to retreat back up when he suffered a headblow that bleeded profusely. Gunshots erupted too as we huddled inside the lobby. Later, we would learn that one Upsilonian died and that several of them and my brods, including Butch, had to be brought to the infirmary or other medical facilities because of wounds sustained for that rumble.

The criminal cases filed and counter-filed, sapped the energies and lustful lives of those who were involved in the lawsuits, including Butch. The cases filed by the Upsilonians were, of course, trumped up as only Bucth was actually there and he was actually a victim rather than an instigator of the violence that night. Manny Balangue and James Cabanatan were not even nowhere near the vicinity of that rumble. Yongyong Afable was with Jopet Laraya and the Upsilonian officers at the Basement when the violence broke out. We also found ourselves drifting more to the national activist cause as the demands to reform Philippine

society intensified. Though I was one of the original founders of the UP High KM chapter, I found myself on the margins as I was unwilling to tally commit to the cause of using all means to change the rules of government. But more and more students were being sucked into the movement to change the government. Butch found himself, getting more and more involved until that fateful night when he told me he was joining those who had already gone to the hills. I rarely saw him after that night, as he began immersing himself fulltime in the armed movement. I went to rallies and even had a role in the infamous Diliman commune as I was part of a group that commandeered taxis and cars and served as part of the transport committee that week that the campus was closed. But I still managed to show up at school. Maintain my grades and finally graduate in April of 1972 as many of my friends and brods were getting arrested and jailed. It was shortly after that, we heard Bucth was killed in an encounter at Botolan, Zambales. Many of us wept and deeply mourned the loss of a dear friend. Each reacted individually, as some like Willie Lazaro also took to the hills. My instincts for living were quite strong and decided to be a mere sympathizer, irreqularly even at that.

There were many lives lost in our generation. And martyrdom was not limited to one fraternity, as some Upsilonians too found themselves going to the hills and dying. But the memory and emotions of that September night, when the death of one fratman may have turned our lives into a different road lingers. Who knows how it would have played out for Butch if Ed and I never bothered to pick him up at their house that night? But it should not devalue the conscious decision Butch made, to offer his life to the cause of correcting social injustices and improving the lot of the oppressed, when he joined the armed movement. He knew he would likely be killed and that in fact there was no sense in joining that movement at all, if you were not ready to die. Injustices remain, some say even intensified, but that is not even the point for young men and women to offer their precious sweet lives for society to listen and to act. I still remember the words of Butch and many others - if not now then when?, if not us then who? And I also remember well my response, not now, not I. They say survivors always have some sense of guilt

The U.P. Beta Sigma Fraternity Alumni Association, Inc. led by outgoing President Dario Sabularse '62 and Executive Vice President Ruben Pascual '76 conferred a Posthumous Award to Brod Vergel "Butch" Landrito, 68-A Blitzkrieg on January 17, 2009 for his relentless pursuit of freedom from the chains of dictatorship and oppression and his covenant to be of service to his fellowmen.

Brod Vergel Landrito was included in the roster of Bantayog ng mga Bayani for his martyrdom during the darkest days of the Marcos dictatorship and martial rule. The citation was proffered by the Bantayog ng mga Bayani Foundation chaired by Senate President Jovito R. Salonga on November 29, 2002.

Butch, as he is fondly called by his fraternity brothers and friends, spent his childhood in Area 2, a community of UP faculty and personnel inside the UP campus in Diliman, Quezon City.

Early in his childhood, Brod Butch showed inclinations to community organizing. In his community, he organized a "barkada" which he named Black Cats.

When Butch joined the Samahang Demokratiko ng mga Kabataan (SDK), Butch made his Black Cats friends as the core of the SDK Chapter in Area 2.

In 1970, he left the family home in UP Campus and moved to an urban poor resettlement in Tandang Sora where he worked as an SDK Community Organizer. He later proceeded to the

mountains of Zambales to continue his organizing work in mainly rural resettlement areas of farmers and the Aetas.

Brod Butch perished in a military encounter in Botolan, Zambales in April, 1972. He was only 22.

During the awarding ceremonies, the Beta Sigma Secretariat prepared a power point presentation with a script written by Brod Cris Michelena '73, showcasing the life of Vergel "Butch" Landrito. Brod Pogs Gaspay '6_ e-mailed a testimonial that was shared by Cris Michelena. Brod Boyet Fernandez '69 likewise spoke of his recollections of Butch Landrito. In response, Brod Cesar Landrito '78, a younger sibling of Brod Butch, spoke of his recollections and fond memories of the latter and expressed their family's profound gratitude to the Fraternity for the tribute and citation.

The awarding ceremony was graced by the family matriarch, Mrs. Paz Landrito and other members of the Landrito family including his other siblings, Ading and Cynthia. Many alumni and residents members attended the solemn event, including former Alumni Presidents Rico Arranz '46, Atong Labadan, Boyet Fernandez, '69, Pat Roman '6_, Butch 's fraternity batchmates, Mel de Santos '68 and Botit Reyes '68 were also present.

After the awarding ceremonies, the alumni association proceeded with the election of the new Board of Directors. Brod Ruben Pascual was unanimously elected President by the new Board.

"Pabili nga ng Pepsi." "Huwag kang bibili ng Pepsi, kalaban yan!"

That conversation with my Kuya is what drove me to join Beta Sigma Fraternity. I saw in him the attributes I also would like to possess.

My family led by my mother Mrs. Paz Landrito, and other members of my clan is very thankful to the U.P. Beta Sigma Fraternity Alumni Association and the residents for recognising the heroism of my brother. Although I only spoke briefly during the awarding ceremonies (sorry, nase-self conscious), I am confident you brods share our family's feeling of loss over the death of my brother.

The citation awarded by the fraternity and the wreathlaying, however, have lifted the spirits of the entire Landrito clan.

Candle Light Memorial Services

IN MEMORIAM: BROD ANTHONY "PATING" SUBIJANO U.P. 72-C: OUR BROTHER, OUR KEEPER...

When I received the text from Ben Abon UP 70 asking me for an article about Anthony, I hesitated and rang the Sydney brods and Melbourne-based UP brods (Alex Roseus UP 79-C and Rolly Zubiri UP 68-A) to ask them to do the honour of writing this article. The Sydney brods told me that I can do it on behalf of everyone here in Sydney.Such a responsibility! How would I describe Anthony>s life as a true Betan and his relationship with us here in Sydney? Anthony and I were close. Not a day passed when he wouldn>t call me. I guessed it was because I was a sis. He>d rather open up to me than admit to the brods his vulnerability. We were in Sydney and he was based in Canberra. A lonely place for him. He came home to Sydney every weekend because Sydney was where his family, brods, sisses and friends were. He endured three hours trip each way just to spend his weekend here in Sydney. Early Monday mornings (around 3am), he droved back to Canberra.

Remembering Anthony always brings a smile, a quiet laughter and fondness of memories. His footprints in hearts will remain forever. Anthony is a character, a natural and indeed very funny. He loves giving unsolicited side comments on everyone. His sense of humor is impeccable. His wit and wicked sense of imagination were matched by his almost accurate description of the person>s movement, emotion or awkwardness. And yet in his own way, Anthony surprised most of us with his vulnerability and sense of loyalty. He did really love us in his special «Betan macho» way. He and the brods would pride themselves of these Betan character traits... not to show emotions. And that they continuously reiterated that they were not «under the saya.» They kept emphasizing these words to us, sisters Betan wives, in such a manner that they seemed to be convincing themselves rather than us.

Anthony was a co-founder of the Sydney Beta Sigma together with Rene Padilla and Bal Villanueva way back in 1983. Everywhere he went friends and relatives knew him as a Betan. He was a true Betan in every sense of the word. He was such a hell of a guy. He rang me and demanded my full attention to the annoyance of my family. Anthony could talk... hours without worries. He talked about the frat, the brods and yes, his childhood. He loved life, he loved the frat, he loved the memories, the times he spent with the brods... his college days. He loved singing karaoke especially Beatles songs. The Beatle songs were the last songs he sang to us. That was June....

Debate was his expertise. He knew so well when to annoy me and yes, we had plenty of arguments, shouting bouts and weeks of not speaking to each other. Every jug or function the brods had, he made sure the brods watched my face on my arrival. He described my sour face because I got lost again. When Anthony was diagnosed with the big «C», the brods and I took turns to drive him where he needed to go. He told me to learn to read the map because he was worried how I will manage when he>s gone. That>s what I love so much about Anthony! He surely is my brother and my keeper.

He was a very positive person. His sense of humor is impeccable. Talking to him was never boring. He really made me laughed and he always understood ... He loved a good life. He loved a good laugh he loved taking photos. Everytime I came back from the Philippines, he made sure he had copies of the brods photos on his file. At the hospital where we spent time with him on daily basis since his diagnosis, he never showed any negative thoughts or attitudes. At times I wondered if he was the patient or the carrier. Anthony had a very good memory. He remembered every detail of stories about a brod or the frat. Life seemed so much better when he was around. He made it simple and fun. Anthony was a very loyal brod and friend. And he demanded the same loyalty from us. He lived his life as a full-bloodied Betan in many ways. His busy and demanding schedule was planned around the activities of the frat. Before he found out he was sick, he already told me his plans to attend several fratballs in the US and Philippines.

During his last days, the Sydney brods and I made sure that we were rostered on daily basis so as to keep him company. We made him feel how much we loved him. Indeed, that>s how my dearest brother Anthony was to all of us,

the Sydney Betan family. Bal was like a father to him. At times when he needed advice and comfort, he went to Bal and his wife Bing. Rene and Dolly were also with him during those difficult times. Anthony is a very private person although with the brods and sisses, he always shared his heartaches and triumphs. Anthony was a very positive person. He never brought his troubles with him in all his dealings with us. He kept it to himself. When he was undergoing his separation and divorce, I was coming back from the Philippines and our present GP Mei Leonor U.E. 75D, told me to ring Anthony to offer him words of comfort. I just couldn>t do it. I didn>t know what to say to him. After three days, Anthony rang me and I couldn>t believe it! He was bubbly as ever! I felt he was doing the reverse. He was consoling me (my dad just passed away then) instead of me comforting him. In his final days in the hospital, Anthony showed his tenacity and sense of humor. Due to radiotherapy, he lost his hair. It was July 12. Mario Manzano U.P.L.B. 85E had this brilliant idea. Instead of waiting for Anthony to leave hospital, why don>t we all celebrate the 62nd anniversary of Beta Sigma with him in the hospital? And we did. Then, we had picture taking. We always have photo shoot when Anthony was around. And brods and sisses who knew Anthony well will reaffirm that. Then, Anthony made a classic comment «I better comb my hair first before you take our photos.»

It was the 62nd anniversary of Beta Sigma that will always linger on every brod>s heart and memory. Every brod who received a text from Anthony on this day shed a tear or two. His text said «BRODS, HAPPY 62ND ANNIVERSARY. I>LL BE AROUND FOR THE 63RD, 64TH, 65TH AND SO ON. CHEERS......ANTHONY» Indeed, Anthony will continue to be with us in spirit. We will not forget. In our hearts, he will remain our first ever Sydney GP. As I used to tease him... our PERPETUAL GP. Through laughter and tears, Anthony will always remain OUR BROTHER, OUR KEEPER. We love you and we will never forget....

Beta Sigma Delisted PAOCC List of "Destructive Gangs"

The national newspaper Philippine Star, dated January 18, 2009, has published an article entitled: "METRO MAYORS TOLD: CRACKDOWN ON YOUTH GANGS," written by Cecille Suerte Felipe. In the article, the President Anti – Organized Crime Commission or PAOCC headed by Mr. Butch Belgica, identified Beta Sigma as among the so – called 235 "destructive gangs" in the Philippines.

President Ruben J. Pascual of the UP Beta Sigma Fraternity Alumni Association, Inc. and Founder Atty. Melicio "Rico" Arranz quickly reacted by sending a reply letter to the Philippine Star and PAOCC, asking that the Beta Sigma be delisted from the roster as Beta Sigma is not, and never will be, a youth gang.

On January 27, Philippine Star printed our letter, quoting Brod Pascual as stating that Belgica's report is "defamatory, libellous and an insult to our reputation."

Brods Pascual and Arranz cited that the name of Beta Sigma actually means "Brotherhood of Scholars." It is a fraternity organized in the University of the Philippines on July 14, 1946 and have produced several distinguished alumni-members, such as former DAR Sec. Horacio "Boy" Morales, DENR Secretary Victor O. Ramos; COMELEC Commisioners Lucenito Tagle; Congressmen Matias Defensor, Prospero Alcala and Cesar Jalosjos and Supreme Court Justice Teodoro Padilla and Vicente Mendoza, among others.

Its alumni declared that the organization has been involved in various endeavours such as environmental projects, medical missions, scholastics trainings, and other relevant social services projects all over the Philippines. They continued by stating that the Fraternity's residents form a group of well-disciplined individuals who continually receive support from the fraternity's Council of Elders which guide them accordingly in all their activities.

Threatened with criminal and civil litigation for the defamatory and libellous insult to the fraternity's reputation, PAOCC Comissioner Belgica responded that the fraternity has been presented in a different manner in their yearend report and in the declassified intelligence report.

Belgica further stated that he himself does not believe that the Beta Sigma Fraternity is composed of the same violent – prone Beta Sigma Delisted as "Gang"

members of fraternities monitored as existing outside the academe and in the streets.

In the end, Belgica further asked for the help of the alumni in addressing the problems of organized delinquency and substance abuse.

Underneath is the full text of the letter addressed to the editor of the Philippine Star in reply to the criticized article dated January 16, 2009:

Dear Editor

On the outset, allow me to assure the alumni of the fraternities (Beta Sigma, APO, AKRHO, Tau Gama, etc.) mentioned in a news item of Philippine Star on January 18, 2009 that I share with them the anxiety caused by the article. The said article was not a press release written by my office. It was a news feature by news reporter, Ms. Cecille Suerte Felipe, who got hold of a copy of our yearend report with attached declassified intelligence information.

I perceived that the mention of the names of some prestigious fraternity was presented in a somewhat different manner from the one in our yearend report and in the declassified intelligence report, thus, the reactions from the fraternities> alumni.

The alumni of the fraternities mentioned, I am sure, are not the same violent-prone members of fraternities monitored as existing outside the academe and in the streets, which was mentioned in the NCRPO intelligence report. As I understand in the briefing, the name of some legitimate fraternities came up in some violent incidents reported and validated information coming from the field.

Of course, I also know that the alumni do not assume command responsibility for the criminal acts of these erring kids. In fact I hope and wish for a positive response of concern as they are now parents themselves. May I therefore solicit their help to address this problem of organized delinquency and substance abuse?

By the way, I did belong to some youth group and fraternity. And so I am still doing my best to reach out and share the Love of God, country and neighbor, to avoid the pitfalls we experienced.

I send my love and prayers to them and to their families too. Mabuhay kayo!

FEDERATION'S PROJECT WILL HOLD MEDICAL MISSIONS IN R.P.

The Betan Community in North America is an offshoot of the Filipino Diasporas, of which the Beta Sigma is a part of.

Longing for that "feeling of kinship" inherent to all betans, those who migrated to different parts of the US and Canada, began looking for brods in their respective areas. In no time, betans from different colleges and universities of the Philippines began to touch base and organize themselves.

An informal structure for coordination among the different alumni chapters emerged. This in when the Federation of Beta Sigma Alumni Chapters in North America was formed. The Federation became the venue for inter-action and coordination among the chapters. It organizes fellowships, reunions, projects, and gatherings of brods throughout North America.

The bible says: "Man does not live on bread alone." The beta sigma federation

in North America lives up to the fraternal values and principle of community service through the projects undertaken, such as the Betan Medical Missions.

Every year, 4-5 medical missions are organized in the Philippines by this Federation in North America. Each chapter-member solicits medicine and funds for the logistical needs of the mission, coordinating with alumni Betan chapters in the Philippines who identify target needy areas, provide medical volunteers, and handles all local logistics needed on each mission.

There are 300 to1200 beneficiaries served per mission. The number of missions has steadily increased in the last five years. The Philippine medical missions will continue to play major parts of Federation programs. These will serve as avenues for Betans in North America to be able to give something back to their mother country. The deplorable healthcare system in their home country is the ironic inspiration that drives the North American brods to go back here every year, all at their own personal expense. The long lines and anxious faces are soon replaced by big thankful smiles (or tears) as the volunteers and fraternity brothers' work together to heal the sick and aid the injured.

To fulfill one of its main objectives, the Beta Sigma Alumni Association in North America is to establish and sustain a permanent Betan medical clinic and be able to duplicate this all over the country. Medical missions are scheduled in the next month this year in the following areas;

PROFILE: UP DILIMAN RESIDENT BRODS

Looking at their non-academic interests reminds alumni brods of their kind. Many are into martial arts, including the latest-trend mixed martial arts. Their sports interests include basketball (of course), tennis, track and field, and present craze airsoft combat. Many are musicians (as always), playing trumpet, oboe, bass guitar, and piano. Some are content to be hooked on computer gaming and web designs, interests that can produce a future given the digital age. Poker? Yes, they have substituted our "pusoy".

The Diliman brods has Miguel Gerard Alo as their Grand Grincep for the second straight year. He is the son of Gerard Alo, UP Diliman Batch '72 and one of four sons of Gerard to enter the fraternity.

His term ends at the end of February when the residents elect a new GP. A climax to Miguel's reign, "Malmon Cup 2009" will be held in early February which is an intra-fraternity Olympics. Up for grabs are championships in basketball, Quiz Bee and the top event – SOMA.

The UPBSFAAI will push the residents to increase their number to at least 50 per campus for the incoming school year and commits total support for this massive effort.

The Secretariat encourages the brods to regularly visit its new office to rekindle old ties and to have their rendezvous appointments with brods. The office actually serves as a center wherein bonding among alumni brods can take place. If a Betan alumnus already misses the Betan lobby or the Betan steps, the Secretariat's office can serve as the Alumni's tambayan, just like our old tambayan in UP.
